



AWARDS AND PRIZES

THE FORBES PRIZE LECTURE



One of the highlights of the Congress will be the **2024 Forbes Prize** Lecture, delivered by **Prof. Dr Luiz A. C. Souza FIIC**, Full Professor - Conservation Science - CECOR - Center for Conservation of Cultural Heritage at the School of Fine Arts, Federal University of Minas Gerais in Belo Horizonte, Brazil on the opening day of the Congress.

The lecture by Prof. Dr. Luiz Souza will focus on, 'Promoting Social Diversity and Inclusion in Cultural Heritage Preservation: Advancing a Global Community Committed to Conservation'. This preliminary title for the lecture entails not only respecting -

and knowing more about - the cultural heritage of minorities, but also delving into the intricate technicalities concerning the climate, material composition, and overall vulnerability of cultural heritage sites, collections and immaterial heritage, on a global scale.

The Forbes Prize Lecture traces its roots to 1958, when a Forbes Prize Fund was set up at the Fogg Art Museum, Harvard University, USA, to which financial contributions were made in recognition of Edward W. Forbes's services to conservation. The fund was to be administered by IIC to provide a prize for outstanding work in the field of conservation. It was agreed that the accumulated funds should be awarded in the form of a fee for a Forbes Lecture at the 1961 Rome Congress, and that Harold Plenderleith would be a suitable recipient.

THE KECK AWARD

In 1994, the IIC Council announced the establishment of the IIC Keck Award, generously endowed by Sheldon and Caroline Keck to commemorate their shared lives of distinguished achievement in conservation. The award is presented every two years at the IIC Congress to - in Caroline Keck's words - the individual or group who has in the opinion of the Council contributed most towards promoting public understanding and appreciation of the accomplishments of the conservation profession.



Collaborative and Sustainable Management of Heritage

The management of cultural heritage faces unique challenges in developing countries, such as limited resources, lack of capacity and a growing need to engage the community. This roundtable will explore how government, international agencies, the private sector, and communities can collaborate to overcome some of these challenges and advance the sustainable management of collections and sites. Although the discussion will focus on Peru, much of it will be equally applicable to all of Latin America.

The lack of data on current challenges and on-going activities across different nations frequently hinders progress for conservation professionals in developing countries. In the lead up to the IIC Congress, the local organising committee conducted an extensive (and unprecedented) survey across much of Latin America to identify common areas of conservation activity, teaching and research; potential resources that could be shared; the main needs of the region; and barriers that might be slowing or preventing response and advancement. Having gathered responses from over 600 individuals and institutions, this roundtable will present some of the key findings from that survey and explore the current state of conservation education and practice across the entire region.

Developing IIC's Position on Sustainable Heritage Environmental Strategies

IIC has been at the forefront of seeking a sustainable position for the conservation profession for more than the last decade. This includes the widely referenced IIC/ICOM CC 2014 Declaration on Environmental Guidelines, which has directly fed into the recent Green Bizot protocols. Since then IIC has been actively participating in COPs in Glasgow and Egypt and with next year's COP30 being held in Brazil, there is a great opportunity for the participation of South American conservators. Meanwhile UNFCCC is seeking information on indicators for measuring progress on adapting cultural heritage to climate change. This roundtable examines how IIC can continue to lead the profession on these matters. We have done lots of talking, but what are we actually achieving, and how can we measure it?

IIC is pleased to announce a new Congress Scholars 2024-25 programme, 'Innovate: sustainability and leadership for new times' to start at the IIC Lima Congress this September. The programme director is IIC's Executive Director Sarah Stannage FRSA, and lead coordinator Marina Herriges, IIC Regional Programme Manager.

Funded by the Getty Foundation, the programme will enable 30 mid-career conservation professionals from emerging economies to develop their leadership skills, confidence and resilience to take their career to a new level. It will also offer space to reflect on the future of the profession and what leadership in conservation will mean in coming decades as we face big issues arising from the pandemic to the climate emergency.



CREATING A DIVERSE NETWORK OF FUTURE LEADERS ACROSS THE WORLD

The programme is designed to connect and support a diverse group of people develop the skills and confidence to take on leadership roles, giving more equitable access to career development than has been the case in the past.
